Memorial Weekend is for Remembering God's Blessings.

Graduate Recognition Sunday: June 5, 2005 at the 11:00 Worship Service

Every Memorial Weekend and Graduation Celebration brings memories of blessings and miracles in my life. May 7th our daughter Laurie graduated from "the seven year plan" at Augsburg College in Minnesota and "Pastor Dad" needed to be in the cheering section. I wear the T- shirts "Bank of Dad" and "In Dad We Trust" proudly. Next year our youngest daughter Barbie will graduate from Gustavus reminding me that it was only sixteen years ago when Barbie climbed aboard the yellow bus for Crestview kindergarten, which was the same week that I brought our oldest daughter Wendy to Gustavus Adolphus College. As I walked with Wendy across the beautiful campus and came to Grandpa Davies' pickup truck, Wendy gave me a tearful hug and said, "Well Dad, now I've had the tour, let's go home." We laughed and cried at the same time. I don't think the tears from my eyes dried until I got back to Cottage Grove. Perhaps that experience prepared me to appreciate every day in my life and the lives of those with whom God has blessed me in my pilgrimage in life.

When I was told that I might have five years to live because of my kidney failure, I bargained with God for the joy of seeing Barbie graduate. (Don't we all bargain with God at least once in our lives?) God has created so many miracles in my life, could there be yet another miracle? Little seven year old Barbie printed me a precious note before my kidney transplant surgery in 1991 that I have kept in my keepsake cigar box ever since. She said, **"I know it is hard but you have to live with hope. From Barbie Bexell. I love you J."** WOW! What faith.

Every confirmation and graduation class has been very important to me personally. Over the years we have hosted hundreds, perhaps thousands, of kids in our home. I met a young man at Woodwinds Hospital in Woodbury last year who said that he had been to "Barbie's house" several times and really appreciated the chocolate chip cookies. Barbie has always been a great evangelist. One day Barbie asked me to come with her to visit a confirmation girlfriend whose boyfriend was tragically killed in a bike-car accident. The three of us walked arm-in-arm for what seemed like miles. God was there in our tears. The ministry of parenting sometimes means simply **being available**.

I have laughed and cried through many life transitions with youth and young adults all my life. New graduates are now ready for the next great adventure for which God has prepared them. You and I will cheer and possibly cry for them many more times, but I will always know in my heart that God is watching over them, even when I cannot.

Memorial Weekend is also a time for honoring all those who have gone before us, especially

I love PlayDoh. The colors. The smell. You know, that kind of stuff. However, the best part of PlayDoh is the creative juice that it gets flowing each time it is used.

I am one of those "PlayDoh-loving-moms." (As opposed to the kind of mom that never wants PlayDoh in the house or anywhere close like that. This is just a personal preference. Some moms are better at sports or swimming or lots of other fine things.) My daughters and I were reflecting on all of the PlayDoh "stuff" that we had to support our habit – like Fuzzy Pumpers, jewelry sets, flower sets, molds, finger puppets, fun factory, miniature oven, pizza set, rolling pins, cookie cutters, and more.

We had a red mesh bag that came filled with a "Discovery Toy Kitchen Set" that we commandeered for a "travel selection" of PlayDoh stuff. So, PlayDoh and the red bag went to the cabin in the Ozarks, to Grandma's house, to hotels, and to the campsite.

The stuff we made was, of course, priceless. Snakes and worms (a given, as even the youngest child can make these). Blue pizzas with red cheese and white pepperoni. Snow men. Baby Jesus in the manger. Assorted flowers, houses, and pets. A game that we still play is to pass out good size hunks of PlayDoh. Then one person offers up a "category," like things we have in the kitchen, or favorite foods, or Bible stories. Then within a prescribed period of time (about 2 minutes) each person needs to craft – without looking at it – some creation from that category, for example, a spatula, a slice of pizza, or Noah's Ark. (The "not being able to look at it" feature of the game is one of the best parts.) Then, when time is up, everybody shows what he or she has made and guesses what everyone else has made. It turns out that this particular game is a favorite at confirmation camp and on retreats as well. In fact, you might have a PlayDoh game expert living in your very own home!

Of course lots of other things are "made" or "worked out" in the course of PlayDoh play. It is a good time to just be together with the people you love. It is relaxing (for those who like PlayDoh). It gives an opportunity to hear "what's up" in people's lives. It spurs imagination. It...well... you can finish this list for yourself.

A while ago Worship on Wednesday (W.O.W.) and in our 11:00 am Sunday worship we sang "Spirit of the Living God," even using actions (believe it or not!). One of the lines in this melodic song is asks the Holy

Spirit to "mold me, " meaning, form us is ways that serve Christ. We have images of God-type-shaping in scripture. For example ones is found in the second account of creation in Genesis 2:7 "...then the Lord God formed man from the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life and man became a living being." Another image comes from Isaiah 64:8 "Yet, O Lord, you are our Father; we are the clay, and you are our potter we are all the work of your hand."

The God that I know and worship is continually creating. This God, known as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit didn't create this beautiful world and then retreat to some heavenly throne. This God continues to create – even creating through us – the created! Through our worship and learning and serving at all ages, we are continually being shaped by God for God's purposes in this world and the next. I really like that idea! I find hope there – that the rough edges might be smoothed and the areas that need fine tuning will be honed. That new ideas would be formed that bring peace and reconciliation. That cures might be found. That the hungry might be fed and the broken might be bound up. And, that in each of us where we have those places that are still yet uncovered (like new PlayDoh fresh from the yellow plastic can) that we can be formed in a way that reveals God's love.

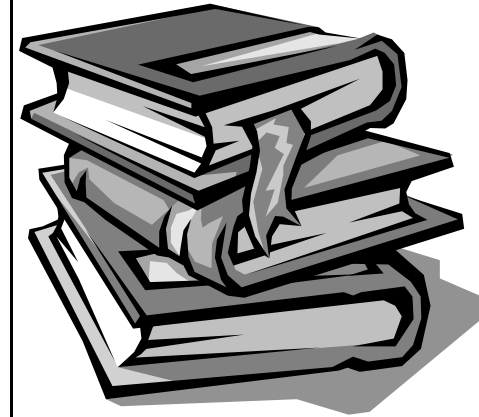

LIBRARY LINES

C.S. Lewis is a well known author and while the Trinity library contains a number of his writings, *The Chronicles of Narnia* should be a must for all upper elementary or junior high readers.. There are seven books in the series all found under JFic. The original copyright was 1955, but these books have become classics and almost a forerunner to today's Harry Potter. Narnia is an enchanted world which is entered magically by two adventuresome young folks. The stories are exciting but always contain a subtle moral. Fortunately, for the younger readers, in the 1990's simplified versions of the stories with beautiful illustrations were made available. [Aslan](#), [Aslan's Triumph](#) and [Edmund and the White Witch](#) can be found in the JE LEW section.

If you don't have children or grandchildren to engage in these wonderful books, you might want to check out [Mere Christianity](#) 230 LEW which is just what the title says. Lewis was an atheist at one time, but became convinced that Christianity was viable [The Great Divorce](#) is a narrative about a voyage through Heaven and Hell. [A Grief Observed](#) is a collection of writings from Lewis just after his wife's death. While these books may not be easy to read, they too are classics and are noted on almost every list of books about Christianity.

MINISTRY TEAMS AND THEIR WORK
May, 2005

Worship and Music More volunteers are needed for ushers, communion presenters, choirs, altar care. Volunteers for Sunday mornings need to receive reminder cards or a phone call. The committee felt that WOW would be more effective and consistent if it continues to meet twice a month during the summer months.

Witness and Outreach The team discussed a friendship packet to be delivered to visitors within a week of their visit to Trinity. This team will work with the Communications Team on content for a new booklet of information. The first Discipleship class on April 29 had sixteen people attending and very positive feedback from them. We have nineteen new members.

Communications Craig Tigerman from the technology committee briefly outlined an idea about repairing and distributing used computers to persons in the congregation who would like to own one. He and others from the tech group will be setting up a plan to facilitate the procedures. There was also discussion about working with the Outreach team to develop informational materials for new, prospective, and present members of the church. New member volunteers, especially youth representatives, are needed for this Communications team.

Congregational Life The church picnic will be July 24th in Peterson Park, Moline. Other upcoming events will be a golf outing and a fishing derby.

World Mission Ministry Team (WMMT) The special offering on Trinity Mission Sunday was \$4,970. Trinity's special offering for "Lutheran World Relief Aid to South Asia Tsunami" amounted to \$3,878. The total disbursed by LWR for this relief effort was \$11.4 million. Now LWR has established a new project titled "Wave of Giving" that's goal is the "rebuilding" of the South Asia area devastated by the tsunami. WMMT requested a grant of \$1,000 from the Endowment Fund for this LWR rebuilding effort.

"TRINITY CARES" Initiative --- A Resounding Success.

Because the saints of Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Church are truly caring and faithful people who remember that all we have in this world is a gift from God, the **TRINITY CARES initiative** raised people's spirits to make **commitments of \$60,375 plus un-pledged contributions of \$781 for a total of \$61,156 of which \$25,733 is already in the bank.** Trinity is becoming the healthy congregation that God created us to become. The new Trinity Transition Ministry process will now have a firm foundation from which to proclaim Jesus is Lord. Praise God and Celebrate!

Congregation Council Minutes for May 10, 2005**Financial Review**

Bruce Peterson led a council review of the current year performance measures versus 2004. Bruce reported that currently, cash flow was not a problem, but if giving continues with the current trend, our budget goals may not be reached. At this time, we are approximately \$6,000 short of what has been budgeted. Bruce will continue to monitor this situation.

Stewardship

Eric reported that the Stewardship Ministry Team and Council liaisons are meeting regularly to analyze pledged giving information and trends.

Council Information

1. It was suggested that more frequent communication with members via telephone would help maintain healthy relationships. This suggestion will be discussed with the ministry teams.
2. Dave Tews shared a time line for the transition team as well as the call process. The Transition team will be formed and meeting by the end of May with the goal of completing the congregational profile by September.
3. Pastor Joel reported that the Human Resources team has finalized a performance evaluation process that will be implemented in May. A personnel handbook is also being developed.

Other Business

1. It was reported that all designated funds from the Reid Estate have been dispersed. A sub-team is being formed to oversee the Side-by-side Youth encounters work crew program. John Brooks from ELCA has written a press release that will be sent to various news organizations regarding the Reid Estate disbursements through Trinity.
2. Trinity has been asked to host the Bishop of the Arusha diocese in Tanzania on Saturday, May 21st. This is the same diocese to which Trinity just sent \$42,252 from the Reid Estate Gift to fund the Arusha (Tanzania) Lutheran Medical Center. Trinity will host a brunch from 9:30-11:00 am. The bishop will also be presented with a gift.
3. The following people were approved as congregational delegates to the upcoming synod meeting; Bob Anderson, Jeff Martin, Karen Dowsett, and Deb Robb.
4. Congregational member Judy Rullman submitted a proposal from the Congregational Life Team for Trinity to support the Equal Exchange Coffee program by using this coffee for our church coffee needs. The proposal was approved.
5. The Education/Confirmation team proposed a \$50 per year donation for participants in confirmation ministry. This donation would allow for enhancements to the program.
